1. Endings in -ATE have two pronunciations (both in British and American English)

[**eI**t] pour les verbes : 'altern<u>ate</u>, as'sociate [\exists 's $\mathfrak{D} \int \mathfrak{I} \mathfrak{e}\mathfrak{I}\mathfrak{t}$], 'dele<u>gate</u>, el'labor<u>ate</u>, 'estimate, le'gitim<u>ate</u>, 'decor<u>ate</u>, dis'crimin<u>ate</u>, gener<u>ate</u>, 'moder<u>ate</u>...

2. Endings in –AGE are pronounced [I] (both in British and American English)

3. Sequences -ANGE- et -ASTE- are pronounced [er] (both British and American English)

change, range, strange, 'danger, angel, Assange / waste, 'toothpaste, taste, chaste, haste.

4. The letter A is pronounced [a:] before a mute L (both in British and American English)

<u>al</u>mond ['a: mənd], b<u>al</u>m [ba:m] (onction), c<u>al</u>f [ka:f] (mollet ou veau), c<u>al</u>m [ka:m], h<u>al</u>f [ha:f], p<u>al</u>m.

5. The letter A is pronounced [a:] before a mute R (in British English only): army, harmony, far, Mars...

6. Sequences AN+consonant ou AS+consonant are pronounced [a:] (in British English only*)
